Oak Hill & The Martha Berry Museum- Oak Hill Gardens



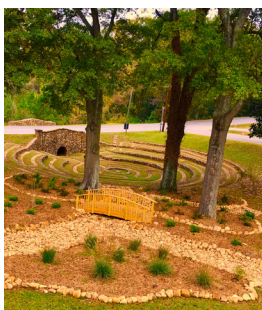

Berry College Arboretum and Tree Walk



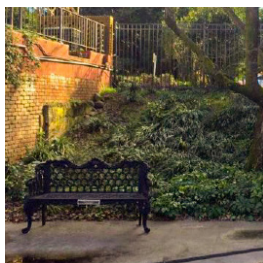

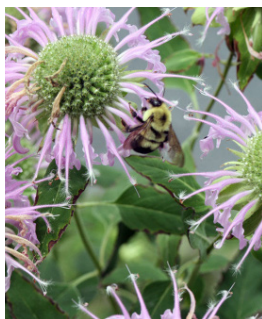
This garden graces the hill of the Clocktower and provides a beautiful serene setting to enjoy views from the hill.

Longleaf Pine Trail



Home to one of the few remaining relict stands of Mountain Longleaf Pine, the trail winds through an experimental longleaf pine forest. Controlled burns along the trail open up various views on Lavender Mountain and loops into the trail leading to the House O'Dreams. Marshall Forest



Once part of the Cherokee Nation's lands, Marshall Forest covers 301 acres and is the only virgin forest in the US within city limits. Two nature trails are within the forest, with one a complete ADA Braille Trail. The trails have plant identification tags, are self-guided and travel on the southwest side of the forest.

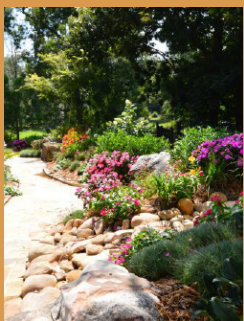
Memorial Magnolias

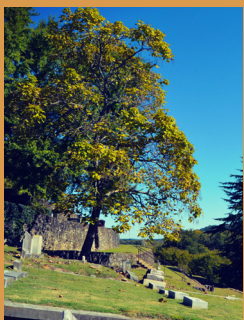
Meditation Gardens at Myrtle Hill Cemetery

Tree Tour at Myrtle Hill Cemetery

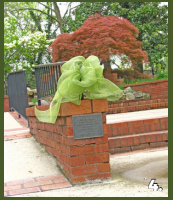
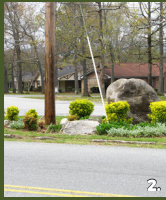

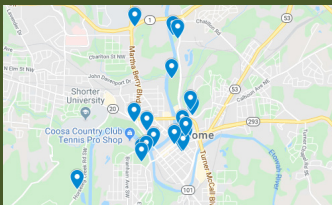
